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### THE GUEST EDITING PROCESS

1. Prospective Guest Editors recruit authors and prepare a proposal.
2. Proposal peer reviewed and assessed by the journal's Editors.
3. Proposal approved; schedule agreed and authors informed by Guest Editors and Editorial Office.
4. Guest Editors handle peer review and make decisions, using online platform.
5. All papers published together as complete issue.
